## Addressing climate change a top priority amid COVID-19 - Environment Sec. Cimatu

Environment Secretary Roy A. Cimatu said addressing climate change remains a top priority for the government even if it is currently preoccupied on controlling the spread of COVID-19.

Cimatu, who chairs the Cabinet Cluster on Climate Change Adaptation, Mitigation and Disaster Risk Reduction (CCAM-DRR), said climate change is a bigger crisis than COVID-19 as it potentially poses existential risks for future generations.

“The climate emergency remains as urgent as ever. It is like the COVID-19 emergency, just in slow motion and much graver,” Cimatu said during his presentation of the 2020 Pre-State of the Nation Address Report of the Cabinet Cluster on CCAM-DRR dubbed as “Pagkalinga Tungo sa Katatagan” on July 22.

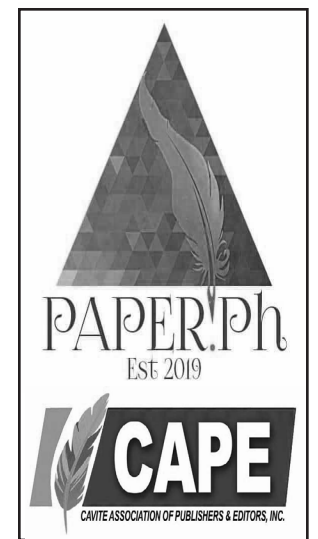
Changes in climate have a multiplier effect, leading to other problems, from ecosystem stability to food production and human conflict. Ecosystem and biodiversity loss are threatening the planet’s ability to provide goods and services.

Deforestation disrupts weather patterns and the water cycle, contributes to climate change, and destroys the habitats of important species. Chemicals and waste are polluting the air, soil and water, killing millions each year.

As a strategy, Cimatu said the government will use the COVID-19 crisis as an opportunity to accelerate climate action by formulating “responses to the worst public health crisis of this generation through a climate lens.”

“The government—through the Cabinet Cluster on CCAM-DRR—will prioritize actions and investments that will reduce long-term health impacts and increase our resilience and adaptive capacity to both the coronavirus pandemic and climate change,” Cimatu said.

# Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services by DepEd to aid in mental health and wellbeing

(From page 1) In addition, they were given lessons and tips on how to cope with the different emotions they are feeling because of the pandemic. The provision featured arts-based activities, ways to create safe spaces, guides on time-management and finding balance, and lessons on mindfulness which includes taking care of our minds, cultivating positive thoughts, and being non-judgmental. Through the lectures and activities provided, participants were able to learn more about normalizing feelings, recognizing common and extreme stress reactions, identifying and expressing needs, and guides to practicing positive coping strategies. They were also reminded that feeling anxious, stressed, and overwhelmed is normal and valid during this challenging time. In a recent report, the World Health Organization recognized that a person's mental and psychosocial well-being is also an equally important part of staying safe and healthy during the COVID-19 pandemic. The resource persons for the activity includes Professor Mariflor "Yeng" Gatchalian, adviser of the Psychological Association line with DepEd Order no. 12, s, 2020 or the Adoption of Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan for School Year 2020-2021 in Light of the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. (From page 4) he said, will continue to respond to extreme weather events and disasters; increase adaptive capacities of vulnerable communities; ensure adequate supply of clean air, water and natural resources; and increase resilience of critical infrastructure. Cimatu said major environmental protection programs like solid waste management, reforestation and biodiversity conservation, must be consistent with the overall response to COVID-19, future pandemics and climate crisis. "High volumes of hazardous waste and the dramatic spread of zoonotic diseases account to the growing challenges that the government has to face to help alleviate problems in this deadly pandemic," he added. Created under Executive Order 24, Series of 2017, the Cabinet Cluster on CCAM-DRR DENR is mandated to focus on the protection and conservation of the environment and natural resources, and serves as a venue for discussing inter-related concerns on climate change and disaster risk management. (From page 4) of the OFW in violation of the President's directive to welcome all OFWs subject to local health protocols. On the other hand, DILG Spokesperson Undersecretary Jonathan Malaya said that the explanation and corrective actions done by the governors of Abra, Antique, Bukidnon, and Camiguin as contained in their replies to the Show Cause Order issued by the DILG were accepted by the Department as justified. "Hence, having found their explanations to be in order, the Department has closed its investigation," he said. For instance, the governor of Abra initially restricted a farm company in carrying and transporting its poultry products outside their province but the said company was eventually able to ship out its produce unhampered upon renewal of its corresponding Certificate of Registration Meat Transport Vehicle. The governor of Antique initially prohibited the entry of delivery of hardware and construction materials but she eventually reissued the executive order without an express prohibition on construction material delivery and entry in the province. The explanation of the governor of Camiguin was likewise accepted as justified.

The DILG also sent a letter of admonition and warning to a city mayor and two municipal mayors. The city mayor from Central Luzon was admonished by the Department for holding a mass gathering when the local executive distributed Social Amelioration Program (SAP) forms to the transport sector. The recipients who still went the next day were immediately dispersed to avoid any violation. The City Government later on committed to the DILG that it will adopt corrective measures to avoid similar incidents. A town mayor from Western Visayas was also admonished for refusing to allow an Overseas Filipino Worker (OFW) to be quarantined within the municipality because the seaman was said to have come from an "infected country" despite obtaining the necessary clearances from appropriate agencies. The DILG said there was no showing that the Municipal Government exerted effort to facilitate the return

of the OFW in violation of the President's directive to welcome all OFWs subject to local health protocols. On the other hand, DILG Spokesperson Undersecretary Jonathan Malaya said that the explanation and corrective actions done by the governors of Abra, Antique, Bukidnon, and Camiguin as contained in their replies to the Show Cause Order issued by the DILG were accepted by the Department as justified.
